

MARIA EDGEWORTH

A Draft List of the early appearances of her stories for children

Preliminary note: In 1780 R.L. Edgeworth and his wife Honora were experimenting with an easy-reading book for young children, all of which survives is *Practical Education: or, the history of Harry and Lucy* Vol. II... Lichfield: printed by J. Jackson, and sold by J. Johnson... London, MDCCCLXXX. It is unlikely that the book was ever published “for the market”, but it has been called “the inspiration for all [Maria’s] children’s books” and its text appears in the first two parts of *Easy Lessons* (no.2 below).

For Young People) pp.1-62 ("obligingly furnished by her for the present series"; and *Poor Bob* appeared in *True Heroism and Other Stories* same pub. same series, 1873 (pp.133-142). ("This little story, by Miss Edgeworth, appeared some years ago in a juvenile annual, and has been reprinted with the approval of the lamented authoress")

Some of ME's stories have been reprinted for children in the later twentieth century: *Lazy Lawrence and other stories*, using illustrations by Chris Hammond from an earlier volume, appeared in 1948 in the Watergate [!] Classics ed. by John Betjeman, whose contribution is to be found on the front and rear flaps of the jacket. Gillian Avery included "Waste not, Want not" in her anthology *The hole in the wall*, illus. Doreen Roberts (O.U.P. 1968) and "The Birthday Present" in *Hullabaloo!* Ed. by Barbara Willard (Hamish Hamilton, 1969) memorably illus. by Fritz Wegner.
