


Food for Thought by Nan Frydland and Rose Nzapa Ayeke


My name is Rose Nzapa Ayeke.

for a long time.






Our English class went to a farmers' market.


We bought vegetables.

I studied to become an American citizen.




I became an American citizen. Now, I can vote!


Because I live in
